What is the Thursdays in Black Campaign?

Dressing in black on Thursdays is to draw attention to the culture of violence against women in our world. This practice was started by the World Council of Churches (WCC) during the decade 1988-1998 to show solidarity with Women's struggle against rape as a weapon of war and other abuse. Today it would cover forced marriage especially of children and Female Genital Mutilation. In many countries it is women and their children that bear the brunt of poverty, injustice and inequality.

Inspiring Campaigns that demonstrate women's resilience include:

- > The **Mothers of the Disappeared** In Buenos Aires, Argentina, who protested against the disappearance of their children during the violent dictatorship.
- > The **Women in Black** in Israel and Palestine against war and violence.
- > **Women in Rwanda and Bosnia** protested against the use of *rape* as a weapon of war in the genocide.
- > **Black Sash** movement in South Africa protesting against apartheid and its use of violence against black people.

Thursdays In Black

Against Sexual and Gender-based Violence

Gender-based violence is frequently hidden, and victims are often silent or silenced, fearing stigma and further violence.

We all have a responsibility to speak out against violence, to ensure that women and men, boys and girls, are safe from rape and violence in homes, schools, work, streets – in all places in our societies.

WEAR BLACK ON THURSDAYS

What about in Scotland?

Sexual crimes account for 8% of all crimes recorded in Scotland in 2018-19. The numbers recorded by the police rose from 12,487 to 13,547 of which rape was 2293 and attempted rape 133. Could that be the equivalent of more than 6 each day? And these are just the reported and prosecuted numbers!

It is claimed 1 in 10 women in Scotland has experienced rape while 1 in 5 women has had someone try to make them have sex against their will. (Source: Natsal-3: key findings from Scotland:

In 2016-17 at least 43% of the 10,273 recorded sexual crimes related to a victim under the age of 18.

In 2017-18 there were 59,541 reported instances of domestic violence, 25% of all crime. In 4 out of 5 of these the victim was female and the accused male. 35% of all incidents took place on Saturdays or Sundays.

The abuse does not have to be physical. Any behaviour that allows a person to exercise control and power over another person can become abusive.

Don't be silent – Speak out!

Don't be blind

Don't be deaf

Don't turn away

Not all violence is physical. Think also of threats and controlling behaviour.

Each human life is precious and full of potential.

Looking someone in the eye recognises their humanness, helps them build self esteem, that they are worthy.

Pornography and prostitution objectify women and destroy relationships.

Sexist comments, jokes and attitudes would not be funny if they referred to your wife, mother, daughter, friend.

Bring the hidden to light. Don't let violence fester in dark corners.

Misogyny is a power game, institutionalised in our society. Speak out for gender equality and justice.

Remember 80% of survivors of domestic violence are women, and 95% of rape victims are women.
