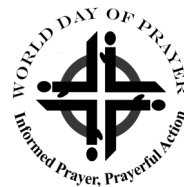

STORIES & PRAYERS

We'll hear of widows overcoming oppression, mothers finding courage to send their daughters to school, and daily challenges testing people's faith - experiences that resonate across cultures and borders.

These stories aren't meant to bring despair. Rather, they show how God truly gives rest even in the most difficult situations.

BEATRICE'S STORY: The Burden of Systemic Oppression

My name is Beatrice. I became a widow at 28 when my husband was killed in a communal clash. That day, I lost my partner and my place in society. Alone with three children, I faced a world that turned its back on me.

As a widow in Nigeria, I struggled with poverty, losing our income, and finding work. My in-laws, instead of supporting me, tried taking my husband's property. Some days, I didn't know how to feed my children or pay their school fees.

In despair, I found strength in faith and a church support program, where I met other widows. Their resilience and commitment to Christ

inspired me. One widow organized donations of food, clothes, and money, motivating me to help others too.

Through faith and community, we honor our husbands' memory, lay our burdens at Jesus' feet, and find strength to carry on.

JATO'S STORY: The Burden of Religious Persecution

My name is Jato, a Christian mother in northern Nigeria. Each day, I send my 14-year-old daughter, Amina, to school with unease, thinking of Leah Sharibu, taken by Boko Haram at the same age. Leah's story is a haunting reminder of the dangers we face.

Living amidst religious persecution is challenging. Some Christians are killed for their faith, yet by God's grace, we coexist with Muslim neighbors in parts of Nigeria. Conflicts over faith aren't new, even in Jesus' time. He taught us to love those who wish us harm, offering the promise of His light yoke.

Through faith, I've learned to love my neighbors despite adversity. In Damaturu, Christians pray for Leah's safe return. Their resilience inspires me to keep loving and living alongside all. I pray daily for Amina's safety and heart, hoping she will stand firm in faith and see God's image in all. This surrender to Christ makes our burdens lighter, offering true rest in Him.

BLESSING'S STORY: The Burdens of Poverty and Despair

My name is Blessing, and I've lived in Lagos all my life. Nigeria has changed, but not as we hoped. We dreamed of progress, yet poverty and despair persist.

Every day, the weight of these struggles grows. Trapped in cycles of disappointment, even good news feels unbelievable. The government focuses on itself, neglecting the people. Salaries barely sustain us, while a few grow richer. Basic foods like rice are now luxuries. Meanwhile, our youth face joblessness, leading some to despair or crime.

Despite this, hope shines through. My neighbour Grace, who lost her job and husband, started a small soap business to support her children. Her resilience inspires me. She often says, "Blessing, we are living by faith." Her words remind me of the Bible: "Those cast down will be lifted up."

This is my testimony: even in struggle, God's faithfulness endures. Though burdened, we are not broken. We continue to work, hope, and pray for the Nigeria we know is possible.

Holy God, Giver of life and Sustainer of all, we give you thanks and praise for the persistence of Blessing, and all who keep moving forward despite even the most difficult circumstances. Continue to strengthen and comfort all who are weary [from](#) the burdens of life.

We pray for families and communities struggling to cope with the pressures of life. When stress and hardship make it difficult to support one another, remind us of your endless patience and love. Help us to extend that same grace to those around us.
